Additional skill-building exercises to support home-based educators in recognizing and using **EVERYDAY LITERACY** learning opportunities in **EVERYDAY HOME AND FAMILY ROUTINES**

The practice activities below provide follow-up support to assist early intervention practitioners and home visitors to identify everyday literacy opportunities that naturally occur within a family's daily routine.

These exercises provide early childhood professionals with more opportunities to practice, evaluate, and reflect about everyday literacy activities. The intent is to take these exercises into the home and community to provide the practitioner with an authentic, hands-on experience utilizing the components of the CELL (Center for Early Literacy Learning) model.

Exercise 1

Activity:

Consider the interests you identified for the child from the skill-building exercises for Child Interests. Select one of the child interests that you identified. **Document** how you will provide many opportunities for the child to explore that interest (**breadth**) and how you will expand on early literacy learning within the activities (**depth**).

Example from the CELL training: A child is interested in trains so you make available books, songs and activities about trains (breadth). When a child is playing with trains, ask questions about where the train is going and what the train is carrying; add people or traffic signs (depth).

Provide these everyday literacy learning opportunities to the child during your next home visit.

Evaluate:

- In what ways did you provide breadth and depth related to the child's interest?
- How did the activities help the child practice emerging language and literacy abilities?
- Could the activities support the child in developing new language/literacy abilities? How?
- Was the child able to repeat the activities over and over if interested? How did the child respond during the activities? How did the child participate within the activity?

Reflect:

Were you able to do the following?

- Increase how often the child gets to participate in interest-based everyday early literacy learning activities?
- Increase the number of interest-based everyday literacy learning activities?
- Increase the variety of interest-based everyday literacy learning activities?
- Increase participation in those activities that occur frequently and provide lots of early literacy learning opportunities?
- How will you support the parent in understanding and using everyday literacy activities to promote his/her child's early literacy abilities?

Exercise 2

Activity:

Select a family with which you will explore everyday literacy learning. Talk with the family about their daily or weekly routines. Next, talk with the family about their child's interests.

Use the *Interest-Based Everyday Literacy Activity Checklist* tool to help the parent(s) identify everyday literacy activities and routines that his/her child finds interesting. Assist the parent in thinking about ways to provide literacy learning opportunities within the everyday routines and activities.

For example: A child loves eating at a restaurant every Saturday night. The child's parent can provide an everyday literacy opportunity by reading the menu to the child, or inviting the child to "read" the menu.

Evaluate:

- How do the everyday activities provide the child with opportunities to practice emerging literacy abilities?
- How will the child participate in the everyday literacy activity?
- How will the parent support his/her child's participation in the activity?
- How will the parent know the child is interested in the activity?

- Increase how often the child gets to participate in interest-based everyday early literacy learning activities?
- Increase the number of interest-based everyday literacy learning activities?
- Increase the variety of interest-based everyday literacy learning activities?

- Increase participation in those activities that occur frequently and provide lots of early literacy learning opportunities?
- How did you support the parent in understanding and using everyday literacy activities to promote his/her child's early literacy abilities?

Exercise 3

Activity:

After you assist the parent in identifying his/her child's interests, use the Daily Schedule tool format below to help the parent identify opportunities throughout the day during which he/she can provide interest-based literacy activities.

Evaluate:

- What literacy activities did the parent identify that he/she could provide related to the child's interests?
- What literacy activities did the parent identify that he/she could provide during daily routines?
- How often is the parent able to provide interest-based literacy activities for his/her child?
- How will the parent know the child is "engaged" in the activity?

Reflect:

Were you and the parent(s) able to do the following?

- Increase how often the child gets to participate in interest-based everyday early literacy learning activities?
- Increase the number of interest-based everyday literacy learning activities?
- Increase the variety of interest-based everyday literacy learning activities?
- Increase participation in those activities that occur frequently and provide lots of early literacy learning opportunities?
- How will you support the parent in reflecting on his/her practice of using everyday literacy activities to support his/her child?
